Serious Other-Than-Serious Posting Requirements	\$7,000 per violation	\$12,471 per violation	<p><u>OSHA Penalties (2016, July)</u></p> <p>This page summarize the increase in OSHA’s maximum penalties, which are set to increase for the first time since 1990 as part of overall federal penalty adjustments mandated by Congress last year. OSHA's new penalty levels will take effect after Aug. 1. Any citations issued by OSHA after Aug. 1 will be subject to the new penalties if the related violations occurred after November 2, 2015. To provide guidance to field staff on the implementation of the new penalties, OSHA will issue revisions to its <i>Field Operations Manual</i> by August 1.</p>
Failure to Abate	\$7,000 per day beyond the abatement date	\$12,471 per day beyond the abatement date	
Willful or Repeated	\$70,000 per violation	\$124,709 per violation

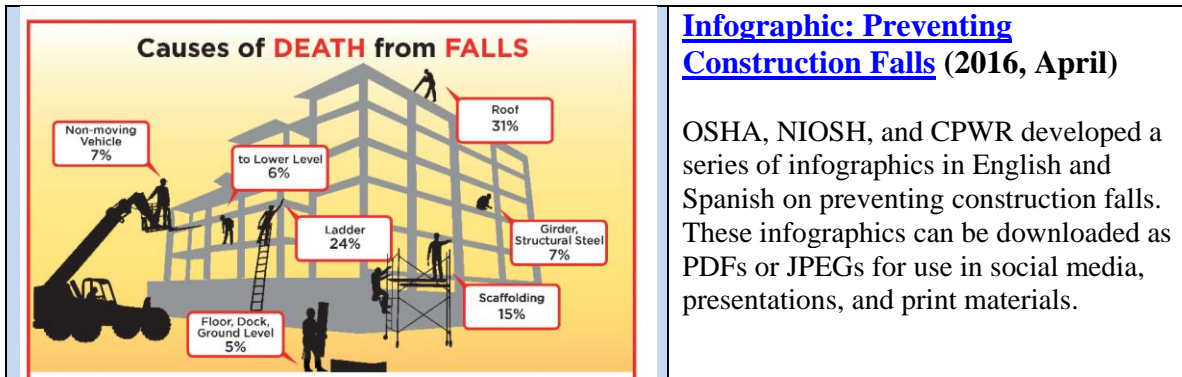

Materials Developed:	The grantee provided training programs for workers, employers and 4-hour train-the-trainer classes on workplace violence. Target audience includes small businesses, young workers, minority, and other hard-to-reach workers. Training topics include an introduction to hazard identification and control, prevention, and mitigation of workplace violence, worker rights and whistleblower protection. Training materials include handouts that are accessible for low-literacy youth and adult participants.

Materials Developed:	The grantee provided materials in fall prevention training in residential construction for vulnerable workers and employers in New England. Training topics included an introduction to fall prevention, working on roofing with emphasis on residential construction, proper use of fall arrest systems, ladders, scaffolds, and worker rights. Previously developed materials were used. Training was provided in English, Portuguese, and Spanish.
